Aim of HSE

- Plan for the current and future health and social care needs of the local population in the Grangeegorman area
 - in the current environment of health transformation



Aim of HSE development on the site

- To provide primary, community and continuing care services (PCCC) for the local population.
- General primary care services
- Specialist services to include:
 - Children and families,
 - Older persons,
 - Disabilities,
 - Mental health
 - and co-operate with DIT in serving the health needs of its students and staff



Mental Health Services

- St. Brendan's Hospital once catered for over 2,000 patients
 - today is home to approx 100 patients
- Replacement residential accommodation and supporting facilities are needed on site for those patients



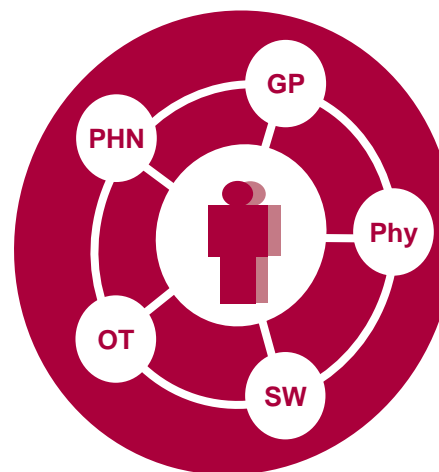
Primary Community & Continuing Care Model

- National Strategy
 - Single interconnected, integrated health and social care system meeting 90% of population needs
 - Services delivered by Primary Care Teams to populations of approx 10,000



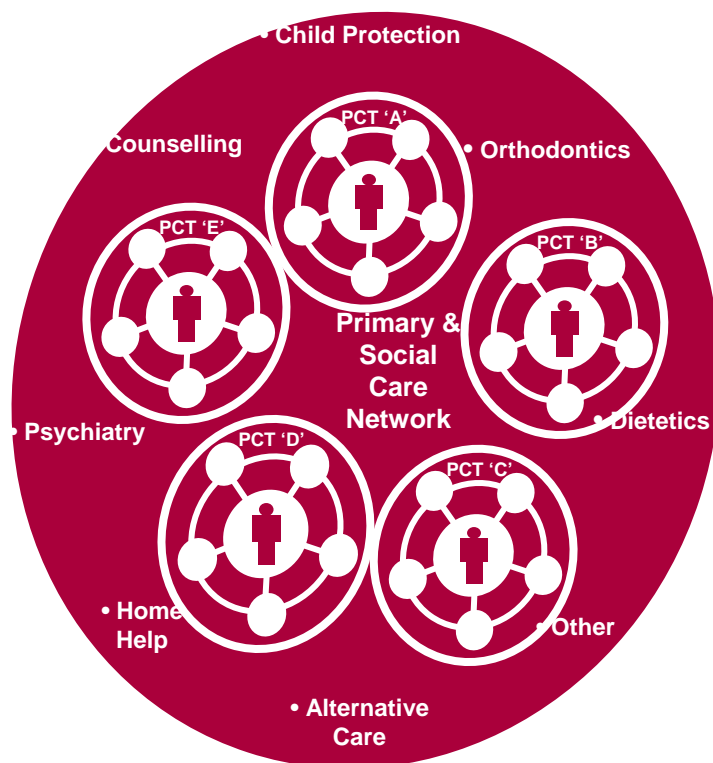
Most of people's primary and social care needs are met by a local Primary Care Team (PCT)...

- General Practice
- Community Nursing
- Occupational therapy
- Physiotherapy
- Social Work
- Speech and Language therapy





An average of 5 PCTs make up a network
– a Primary and Social Care Network (PSCN)
– serving a wider but related population of 30,000 to 50,000 people...



PSCNs include a pool of specialised resources that serve the PCT communities – *at or close to home...*



Grangeegorman Health & Social Care Needs

- Population (current 55,000) will be served by a number of Primary Care Teams and a Network
- Current facilities in the neighbourhood are totally inadequate and will be upgraded



Other services

- Availability of funding will determine the extent of additional services on the site such as
 - Community Nursing Units for Older Persons
 - Living units for the ‘Frail elderly’
 - Purpose built units for people with disabilities
 - Social inclusion units
- To be planned for
